March Program Review—Garmin Tour

GPS – It doesn't stand for Garmin Products and Services, but rather, Global Position Satellite which defines the basic technology for Garmin's outstanding success in the Navigation & Communication information products industry!

Garmin, located in Olathe, Kansas, graciously hosted our March 15th luncheon in their state-of-theart 200+ capacity auditorium. This auditorium is housed within the newest building on the Garmin campus, referred to as "The Tower". Mark Stubbolo,

coordinator of the program, began by introducing Garmin's CFO, Kevin Rauckman, who provided us with an overview of Garmin and a break- down of the new construction and the facility we were about to tour. We then



broke out in tour groups, which were led by key members of the design and construction effort: Ron Millare of Turner Construction, Pat Duff with PJV Architects, Mark Huber with Turner Construction and Kevin Rauckman, CFO, Garmin.

Garmin is a 15-year old company that went public in December of 2004. Garmin products provide global support of navigation and communication information through GPS (Global Position Satellite) in the following categories: Marine, aviation, and outdoor recreation. Garmin employs roughly 1,000 folks in the Kansas City area with other facilities located in the UK and Taiwan. We were here to tour its newest addition to the Olathe campus, "The Tower". This addition houses primarily engineering R&D and technical services, as well as providing expansion for several hundred more employees. Garmin's campus encompasses approximately 90 acres. With the addition of phase three, they have utilized roughly 45 acres. The square footage breakdown of the new construction is as follows: 140,000 square feet of expanded warehouse, 337,000 square feet of parking garage, and the 450,000 square foot office tower. As a group, we toured three floors of the new eight-story building. Just a couple of the focal points included the intriguing serpentine design of the new



building's entire southern exterior and of the beautiful, yet unfinished, courtyard. It was described by our tour guide as a tribute to one of the original founders of

Garmin, Min Kao. This area will be developed into a relaxing commons area for all employees to enjoy with tranquil waterfalls and fish ponds. As a side note, the name of the company comes from the two founding partners' names: GARy Burrell and MIN Kao . . .GAR-MIN.

The attendance for this program was tremendous with almost 100 IFMA members and guests. The program committee thanks Garmin for opening its doors and sharing this fabulous construction project with other facility managers

and allied members of the Greater Kansas City IFMA Chapter. What an awesome opportunity.



FOCUS FEATURE

Spring has arrived, and with it, in the Midwest, Tornado Season! This article, pulled from the federal Office of Personnel Management website http://www.opm.gov/emergency/PDF/National-FamilyGuide.pdf) provides some suggestions on how to prepare for emergencies.

During an emergency your family may have little or no time to plan what to do next. It is necessary for you to learn about the things you can do to be prepared before an emergency occurs. Two actions that will help you do this are to develop an emergency plan, and prepare an "Emergency Go Kit."

Create an Emergency Plan

Part of creating your household emergency plan is to learn about the types of emergencies that may affect your community, how you'll be notified of an event, and plans that may already be in place to deal with these events. Determine if your community has a warning system-via televisions, radio, or another signal-recognize what it sounds like and what to do when you hear it. Emergencies may strike when your family members are away from home, so find out about plans at your workplace, school, or anywhere else you and your family spend time. Steps to take in creating a household emergency plan include:

- 1. Meeting with household members and discuss the dangers of possible emergency events, including fire, severe weather, hazardous spills, and terrorism.
- 2. Discussing how you and your family will respond to each possible emergency.
- 3. Discussing what to do in case of power outages or personal injuries.
- 4. Drawing a floor plan of your home. Mark two escape routes from each room.
- 5. Teaching adults how to turn off the water, gas, and electricity at main switches. *If for any reason you do turn off natural gas service to your home, call your gas utility company to restore service.

DO NOT ATTEMPT TO RESTORE GAS SERVICE YOURSELF.

- 6. Posting emergency contact numbers near all telephones, and pre-program emergency numbers into phones with autodial capabilities.
- 7. Teaching children how and when to dial 911 to get emergency assistance.
- 8. Teaching children how to make long-distance telephone calls and/or to use a cell phone.
- 9. Choosing a friend or relative that all family members will call if separated (it is often easier to call out-of-state during an emergency than within the affected areas).
- 10. Instructing household members to turn on the radio for emergency information.
- 11. Pick two meeting places:
 - A place near your home
 - A place outside your neighborhood in case you cannot return home after an emergency.
- 12. Taking a Basic First Aid and CPR Class. Contact American Red Cross for more info.
- 13. Keeping family records in a waterproof and fireproof safe. Inexpensive models can be purchased at most hardware stores.

Prepare an Emergency Go Kit

Often during an emergency, electricity, water, heat, air conditioning, or telephone service may not work. Preparing an Emergency Go Kit ahead of time can save precious time in the event you must evacuate or go without electricity, heat, or water for an extended period of time. You should consider including the following items in an Emergency Go Kit:

New IFMA Task Force

Later this month, a new IFMA task force will survey Lifetime Members, Retired Members and members 60 years and older to gauge their interest in forming a Retired Members Program. Late last year, IFMA's Board of Directors created a Retired Members Task Force to evaluate the need for a retiree program that would actively engage retired members and provide opportunities for participation within respective IFMA locations. Retired Members Program content would focus on achieving strategic goals in IFMA's Strategic Plan and Balanced Scorecard. IFMA Newsreel - The origins of IFMA

Prior to IFMA's founding, inconsistent job titles and descriptions meant that the average facility manager and the general public may not have viewed facility management as a real profession. Office environments were on the verge of change, and there was no association that addressed facility management needs. In December 1978, facility management came one step closer to being a recognized profession when Robert Probst of Herman Miller Research Corp. hosted a conference entitled "Facility Influence on Productivity" at Herman Miller's Merigold Lodge in Holland, Mich. Probst's goals for the meeting were to bring like-minded facility practitioners together and to establish the Facility Management Institute as an educational and research subsidiary of Herman Miller. During this conference three important figures were introduced: George Graves, who would become IFMA's first president; Charles Hitch, then with the Manufacturers Bank of Detroit; and Dave Armstrong, a professor at Michigan State University who would eventually head FMI. Nearly a year later, Graves and Hitch hosted a conference for facility management professionals at the Renaissance Center in Detroit, Mich., USA. Despite hopes that this meeting would lead to the foundation of a private-sector organization dedicated to facility management, the conference adjourned with nothing settled. "I think the organization didn't materialize in Detroit because we didn't have the groundwork laid for it," Graves said. "All we did was get together and talk about it. No concrete steps were taken though everyone there was in favor of it." Progress finally was made in May 1980, when Graves hosted a twoday meeting at Two Houston Center in Houston, TX to develop the framework for a facility management association. By the end of that meeting, a new organization - the National Facility Management Association -had a constitution and bylaws, temporary offices and an expansion plan. In the following months, Graves served as president, Hitch as vicepresident, Bill Back as secretary and Charles White of Houston Natural Gas as treasurer. According to Back and Graves, the best was yet to come. Shortly after the 1981 convention, Jim Chambers and a group of Canadian facility professionals joined the Association, and the name was changed to what we know today as the International Facility Management Association.

- At least a 3-day supply of water (1 gallon per person per day). Store water in sealed, unbreakable containers. Replace every 6 months.
- 2. A 3-to 5-day supply of non-perishable packaged or canned food and a non-electric can opener.
- 3. A change of clothing, rain gear, and sturdy shoes.
- 4. Blankets, bedding, or sleeping bags.
- 5. A first aid kit and prescription medications (be sure to check the expiration dates).
- 6. An extra pair of glasses or contact lenses and solution (be sure to check the expiration dates).
- A list of family physicians, important medical information, and the style and serial number of medical devices such as pacemakers.
- 8. Special items for infants, the elderly, or family members with disabilities.
- 9. A battery-powered radio, flashlight, and plenty of extra batteries.
- 10. Identification, credit cards, cash, and photocopies of important family documents including home insurance information.
- 11. An extra set of car and house keys.
- 12. Tools such as screwdrivers, cutters, and scissors, duct tape, waterproof matches, a fire extinguisher, flares, plastic storage containers, needle and thread, pen and paper, a compass, garbage bags, and regular household bleach.

HAPPY BIRTHDAY, KANSAS CITY CHAPTER: 18 Years Old in March, 2005

At the editor's request, charter member, Dick Cooper, provided background on the founding of the Kansas City Chapter of IFMA. It looks like all of the things that made IFMA important to its members 18 years ago are still true today.

It all started in the Fall 1986 when (I think) Jack Tinnel invited a group of us for a discussion about starting an IFMA Chapter. At that time, IFMA required a minimum of 10 professional members to become a chartered chapter. This group of people agreed to start a chapter and had an organizing meeting in February or March 1987 at the offices of Yellow Freight System.

The Regional Vice President of IFMA was Dennis Longworth with Johnson Controls. Dennis was soon hired by IFMA as its Managing Director after Mel Schlitt left the Director's spot at IFMA's headquarters in Houston, TX.



On behalf of IFMA, Dennis Longworth came to town and talked about chartering a new KC chapter. I recall about 30 or more people at the meeting, but just a few of us were members. We held elections that night: Lon Parsons was the first President; Jack Tinnel, Vice President; Jim Cook and Velda Tilling were the Treasurer and Secretary. I ended up as the membership person; I don't recall the name of the program person.

As the membership chair person, we experienced nearly 100% growth for each of the next two years. We were doubling in size quickly. Obviously, when you are a small organization, doubling and tripling in size was not too hard.

It seemed to me that when word got out that there was an organization where people could tap into and network with other professionals, this was a huge benefit. Our monthly meetings were simple programs, but they were hugely popular due to the fact we were starved for information and knowledge and we were put in contact with others wrestling with the same issues.

I am not sure we called ourselves facility managers then. We were construction managers, personnel managers, office administrators, architects, etc. I recall to this day meeting Jim Cook at Dodson Group and talking about raised flooring and carpet tile. It was just great to be able to talk to someone in my shoes who had experience in areas I was exploring.

Facility tours were a major hit back then; they still are. It was awesome to go to another facility and see how they managed their space and ask why they did what they did. I really believe, for most of us, much of what we believed was good — FM was validated by the fact other businesses were struggling with the same issues.

I don't know this for a fact, but I have to believe IFMA was awesome for our Associate and Affiliate members, too. IFMA was very sensitive to assuring the professional integrity of FM and not being overwhelmed by vendors and suppliers. To think, once a month a supplier or service provider could come to a meeting and connect with prospective clients! This had to have been huge! On the other hand, FMers liked to compare notes on who and which vendors did a great job. I really believe it brought the FM, architectural, design, and supplier community much closer. As the first membership chair, I saw first hand the huge need for networking and communication.

Membership Committee Growing

The Membership Committee will be expanding! We have many new goals for 2005 and, in order to accomplish those goals, we are expanding our committee. Tom Weathers and Donna Koontz have agreed to help out the Committee, which currently is comprised of Dawn Anderson, Sandra Tarrant and Jim Wilkinson. One of the first challenges of the Membership Committee will be to organize smaller luncheons in several parts of the city that will allow the Board to get to know the membership and receive feedback on what about the organization is good and what could use improvement. These luncheons will be held this Spring and early Summer. We will post the times and locations as they are developed.
